

Elise Benson is a third year student in the Architecture program at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln. Elise has always shown a passion for helping those around her, and after finding her calling in the field of architecture, she is now helping incoming students feel confident in their academic pursuits. For the past three years, Elise has held multiple leadership roles through the College of Architecture and around the Lincoln community. Since freshman year, Elise has held the Events Director position of UNL AIAS, where she organizes social and networking events for students in the college. Additionally, Elise spent her second year serving as a College of Architecture Ambassador, showing prospective students and their families around the college, informing them about coursework and helping them feel welcomed to the campus. Elise's drive to serve others led her to pursue a position as a UNL Orientation Leader, which she obtained after a competitive application and interview process. As the only upperclassmen representing the College of Architecture in New Student Enrollment for 2023, she makes it a priority to encourage new students to follow their passion for design. Elise's mission is to be a resource for incoming architecture students whenever they face challenges throughout college.

Her high level of involvement in the profession, service to the community, and numerous leadership roles at such an early stage in her career make Elise Benson a worthy candidate for the 2023 AIA Student Award.

Commitment to Helping Others

Elise has felt comfortable in leadership positions throughout high school and college. While in high school, she served as the president of her DECA chapter as well as creating her own program for the Girl Scout Gold Award. She formed a group called Generations Connect where she and 13 of her classmates volunteered at local nursing homes and participated in games and activities with residents who didn't receive visitors. After completing 80 hours of community service through Generations connect, Elise was awarded the Girl Scout Gold award along with three other high school Girl Scouts in the state of Nebraska. Although her leadership positions in high school came to a close after graduation, Elise decided she wanted to continue her passion for helping others in college.

Leadership Roles

When Elise started her undergraduate degree in architecture in 2021, she immediately wanted to become a member of AIAS (the American Institute of Architecture students). After showing the executive team her previous experience with planning volunteer events, she was elected as the Events Director of AIAS. As a freshman, Elise gained hands-on experience organizing activities for College of

Architecture students, brainstorming fundraising ideas, and helping AIAS gain membership numbers. Now, entering her third year as Events Director, Elise has helped orchestrate a multitude of AIAS sponsored events and membership opportunities. In sophomore year, Elise was asked to be an Ambassador for the College of Architecture. By being an Ambassador, Elise meets with prospective students and their families and informs them about her experience being an architecture major while giving them a tour of the college. This job requires Elise to be comfortable communicating with strangers as well



as being knowledgeable about the College of Architecture's academic expectations. Through being an Ambassador, Elise discovered her passion for aiding incoming students with their college transition. To take this passion a step further, she applied to be a New Student Enrollment Orientation Leader for the summer of 2023. Being an Orientation Leader is one of the highest leadership roles at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln. After multiple interviews with hundreds of applicants, Elise was one of the 32 students selected to be an Orientation Leader. As an OL, Elise serves as a resource for parents and their students during their orientation day at UNL, while showing them different locations on campus.

Becoming a Mentor

As an Ambassador for the College of Architecture, Elise strives to provide incoming students with clarity as to what they might be doing as an architecture student. During her sophomore year, Elise filmed a "week in her life" video for the college's Instagram, showing followers what studio projects could look like, and how tight-knit the architecture program is. Since she has been heavily involved in the College of Architecture for the past two years, Elise was recently accepted as one of the college's Peer Mentors for the upcoming academic year. As a Peer Mentor, Elise will be partnered with 10-12 freshmen in the Smart Start Course and serve as their resource for any problems or questions they may have in college. Through these experiences, Elise has realized that even early in her career, she can make an impact on the next generation of designers.





Before Elise attended the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, she was heavily involved in her leadership role through Generations Connect. Elise created Generations Connect in High School to serve as a volunteer program to help connect high schoolers with elderly residents in nursing homes that didn't receive visitors. As the creator and leader of the program, Elise was in charge of organizing and facilitating activities, fundraising for the supplies, and recruiting student volunteers. Even during Covid, Elise and her volunteers managed to work around the lockdown by calling their residents and drawing sidewalk chalk messages. In the span of a year, Elise completed 80 hours of community service and was awarded the Girl Scout Gold Award, the most prestigious award and highest achievement in Girl Scouts where only 6% of members receive the award. Elise's project sparked her interest in community service and leadership throughout college.

LINCOLN, Neb. (KLKN) — Elise Benson has always found it easy to interact with older people. Her mom is a speech therapist at a Lancaster County Rehab facility.

So when she had the opportunity to apply for the Girls Scouts of America "Gold Award," she didn't waste any time.

She put in several hours of work in order to create "Generations Connect," a program that connects high school students with nursing home residents.

"I just felt really comfortable around older people and making conversation even though with that huge age gap," Benson said. "I just wanted the residents to find a friend, especially if they don't have family already here to visit.

"I wanted them to get a visitor, but I also wanted my high school classmates to gain communication skills and feel comfortable."

So Elise got many of her classmates at Lincoln East to volunteer. They were able to set up game nights with residents at local nursing homes. They were even able to work around the pandemic, writing letters to residents, making notes in sidewalk chalk and Facetiming each other.

"With that, I was able to see lots of communication between these people that were 70 years apart in age, which was heartwarming to see," Benson said."



She says she's a little sad she's not as involved anymore, but she's grateful for the experiences she had with her residents.

As the Events Director for AIAS, Elise is the main executive team member that is tasked with making their annual formal and awards ceremony happen. For their 2023 Beaux Arts Ball, Elise was in charge of creating the table centerpieces, picking out the decorations, designing the graphic and the photo backdrop, as well as making the individual handouts for the whole college. The dance was a success with its largest number of tickets sold post-Covid. Over 70 students gathered in the Student Union to dance, eat, and mingle. Towards the end of the night, Elise was voted by her peers to win the "Most Involved Student" Award.











Other than planning and hosting the Beaux Arts Ball, Elise has helped organize a multitude of other events this past year for AIAS. At the beginning of every fall semester, the Dean hosts an ice cream social where recognised student organizations can set up booths to inform students about what they do. In August 2022, Elise helped manage the AIAS booth and encouraged new students to attend their upcoming meetings.





This February, Elise was in charge of the AIAS annual fundraising event for Beaux Arts Ball called Crush-4-Crush. Elise created and sent out the google form to all College of Architecture students where they could buy a can of Crush soda for a fellow classmate on Valentine's Day. Elise hand wrote all of the cards and hand-delivered them to each classmate. The Crush-4-Crush fundraiser not only helped raise money for the annual formal, but it also helped strengthen the studio culture and encouraged students to take time to appreciate one another.



Apart from AIAS, Elise was voted to be the representative for her graduating class on the Student Advisory Board. Twice a month, Elise met with the Dean along with other students and faculty members to discuss updates on the college's renovation as well as brainstorm finals week de-stressing events. Elise helped coordinate the first ever "Lawn Games with the Dean" event where she invited her fellow classmates to enjoy pizza and games before finals week.





For 22 days of the summer, Elise met with incoming students and their parents to share her experiences as an architecture major and inform them of on-campus resources that have helped her. This is the second year that the University of Nebraska has ever had an architecture major as an Orientation Leader. As the only architecture major among the 31 other leaders, she is representing all of the other architecture, interior design, community planning and landscape architecture majors in her college. Elise hopes that her interactions with the new students and their families help them feel comfortable and ready for this next chapter of their lives.



Elise has also taken social media viewers into a week in her life as an architecture major at UNL where she has showcased some of her projects from her second year studio. She has also written blog posts for the College of Architectures' Instagram page. Through these posts, Elise's goal is to provide insight as to what a student in the College of Architecture does, give students advice that has helped her, and to help them understand that they have a fellow student there to help them.

I am writing this letter in full support of Elise Benson receiving the AIAS Student Undergraduate Award. I have known Elise for two years and am her UCARE faculty advisor. Within this letter, I will outline how Elise has shown exceptional leadership and made significant contributions during her time as UNL New Student Enrollment Orientation Leader and College of Architecture Ambassador. Elise is an excellent student and within the top 5% of all current undergraduate architecture students who consistently show leadership and impact. Elise's skills and abilities are similar to Geneva Sinkula, the 2020 AIAS Student Undergraduate Award recipient.

Elise has shown sustained and impactful leadership since high school. Elise is accessible, and students find it easy to ask her questions. I expect to continue inviting Elise to participate in the panel discussion during her Junior and Senior years.

Based on her experience as a College of Architecture Ambassador, Elise was selected for the highly competitive and important UNL New Student Enrollment – Orientation Leader position. During the summer of 2023, Elise helped welcome new students to the university. This was especially impactful for the incoming College of Architecture students, who were able to make a direct connection with someone in the college. It's rare for a College of Architecture student to participate in this UNL program, and the College benefited greatly from her participation.

The College and Architecture Program benefits greatly from Elise's leadership and contributions at several levels. The examples above provide an overview of Elise's impact on UNL, the College of Architecture, and the Architecture Program. I do not doubt that Elise will continue to be a leader, make meaningful connections, and impact the college and the profession.
