


#### **Biographical Information**

#### **Professor Thomas Laging, FAIA**

Professor Laging has most recently served as the director of the Architecture Program at the University of Nebraska and as the Killinger Distinguished Professor of Urban Design and Architecture. Professor Laging's teaching specialties include urban design and architectural representation. He has taught or been an invited critic at numerous universities both nationally and internationally—including Tianjin University in China, the Autonomia de Guadalajara and Simon Bolivar University in Caracas.

As a highly skilled environmental visualizer Professor Laging has informed his teaching though an urban design consulting practice. He has been involved with mixed-use urban retail projects in Chicago, Washington DC, Minneapolis, and St. Louis and with town center planning efforts in the Phoenix and Anchorage. He is nationally noted

for his leadership on many of The AIA's Urban Design Assistance Teams (RUDAT'S).

Laging has contributed to numerous campus-planning efforts including DePaul University, the University of West Virginia, University of Kansas, Nebraska Wesleyan University, the University of Nebraska Medical Campus in Omaha and most recently the University of New Mexico South Campus research park expansion. He served for ten years on the Regents Design Review Board for the University of Nebraska System.

Laging was the 2013 Chairman of Nebraska State Board of Engineers and Architects where he has served for over twelve years.

He is a charter member of the Nebraska Capitol Environs Commission and was elevated to a fellow in the AIA for his service to communities. He holds a Masters Degree from The Harvard Graduate School of Design.



#### Advancement of Professional Design Education Through Teaching Excellence

*of Knowing* literacy and graphic proficiency educating and empowering young designers. His prodigious skills in graphic communication and his extensive knowledge of urban design theory and practice have been nationally recognized for their educational, professional, and community development value.

As director of a three year departmental teaching grant, Prof. Laging instituted a series of faculty seminars on teaching methods at various developmental levels in the architecture curriculum. Prof. Laging received a **distinguished teaching award** from the University for adopting these newly researched methods into his teaching.

*Graphics Education for Urban Design* Noted for his teaching of drawing skills to both beginning and advanced students, Prof. Laging has presented visual communications materials to national conferences and local workshops. His recent consulting work in environmental graphics with the Kiku Obata Co. has been instructive to both students and practicing professionals, particularly for its methodology. His recent "Urban Design Watercolor" series for the City of St. Louis for its waterfront and for Forest Park are highly accomplished.

Specifically; Prof. Laging led a well-received workshop on creative drawing at the AIA Nebraska Fall meeting and at the Western Nebraska Chapter AIA Spring meeting of 1995. He organized several graduate workshops and courses on specialized architectural drawing, such as Drawing Classical Architecture, Drawing and Making Ornament, and Advanced Drawing. He has assisted students with the presentation in architectural workshops at the four Lincoln high schools for over four years. Prof. Laging was distinguished as the key note speaker at the Beginning Student Conference in 1984 and again as a presenter at the 1986 meeting. He developed an innovative drawing workshop for students at the National AIAS Forum in 1981.

Community Design As an eminent Nebraska educator, Prof. Laging has continued to successfully link Education educational objectives with interdisciplinary community action. In 987, he established a highly beneficial annual state-wide program of community design assistance in the form of a three week summer workshop. Students and community leaders have enthusiastically embraced over ten of these workshops. Co-taught with Planning Professor Gordon Scholz, AIA, AICP, the program involves intense interaction among graduate students from Planning, Horticulture, and Architecture with community members. The program built substantial statewide good will for the University Of Nebraska College Of Architecture and also resulted in significant improvements in many of the communities, such as the rethinking of the Sanders Co. Historical Society Site Plan, and improvements and preservation of the historic Gottberg building in Columbus. Most notably, this high energy program immersed emerging professionals into the middle of the community decision-making process and gave communities new visions of their futures.

## Advancement of Professional Education Through Community Service

	The most commendable and significant contributions by Thomas Laging, AIA, are based in professional education and demonstrate the vital role a school of architecture can play in enlarging the design perspective of its community and region. Tom's permanent academic appointment at the University of Nebraska has enabled him to perform research and public service to promote, civic, social and AIA objectives. Through his persistent and consistently-sought enterprise, Tom Laging has become a trusted urban design counsel and leader who has protected and enhanced the design vitality of his community.
Environs Plan	The most laudable and enduring of his community service efforts is <i>the Nebraska State Capitol and Environs Plan</i> , which earned Laging, his co-director Roger Schluntz, and the College of Architecture at the University of Nebraska the prestigious <b>First Honor Award in Urban Design from</b> <i>Progressive Architecture</i> .
	The NEA funded student included: educational background on the Capitol an important architectural work by Bertram Goodhue, an outline of the preservation needs of the structure, and the research for the historic residential neighborhoods and significant buildings around the Capitol.
	The study led the way to many important city and state decisions about the building and its context. The study established an urban design overlay zone as part of the comprehensive plan permitting down zoning in the view corridors of the building and was the beginning step in the formulation of the Mount Emerald Historic District. The Plan was instrumental in forming a Joint City of Lincoln-State of Nebraska Capitol Environs Commission. Tom Laging, AIA, serves today as an appointed member to this critical entity.
	For two decades, Tom has pursued the implementation of this urban design and planning effort with patience, vigilance and commitment to purpose. Specifically he has:
Community Design Education	Served as a charter commissioner helping to forge design guidelines; set policy; establish design review authority for the Commission; and initiate development proposals. He has testified to Legislative committees on the importance of various urban design issues and coordinated and directed further design efforts in the Nebraska Capitol Environs district.
South and East Malls	<u>The Nebraska Capitol and Environs Plan East and South Mall</u> charrette (1983) helped establish a more specific design framework for the residential malls, while <u>The Governor's Mansion Assessment of Need Study</u> (1992) outlined a strategy for improvement of the Mansion and grounds which has not had major improvements since its construction in the 1950's.
Centennial Mall	In 1994, Tom Laging, AIA, directed a design programming proposal for the Commission with graduate student Shelly Mcafferty which serves as an expression of the Commission's programmatic desires in its effort to reconstruct the North Mall of the Nebraska State Capitol.

#### Advancement of Professional Education Through Service to the Profession

Service to Local AIA Chapters Numerous AIA Chapters have sought Tom Laging's experienced leadership in organizing and carrying out urban design related charrettes. These high profile public conversions help to develop community consciences about important development issues, advance the role the various AIA Chapters play in effecting important community decisions, shape public opinion, and raise the status of the architect as a citizen. Specifically:

In 1996, Tom Laging, AIA, served as an *advisor and team leader* to the Omaha Chapter AIA on the "Aksarben Reuse Charrette." This highly publicized AIA event resulted in the designation of the old race track site as a new campus for the University of Nebraska at Omaha and a business campus for one of Omaha's largest employers.

Professor Laging brought his gifted graphic abilities and accomplished urban design leadership skills to the Gilbert and Mesa UDAT's for the Rio Salado Chapter. These efforts resulted in noteworthy changes in development thinking in a large urban area of eastern Phoenix during a critical period of rapid expansion in the 1980's.

provided design services that generated funding for several buildings in the Omaha low-income community, the most significant being the **South Omaha Multi**-

#### Advancement of Professional Education Through Linkages to Communities

The value and significance of Laging's urban design work for Phoenix brought recognition from Dean John Muenier, AIA, RIBA, at Arizona State University and Joint ASU/City of Phoenix led to Tom's appointment as the First James Elmore Visiting Chair in Urban *Center for Urban Design* Design. This position enabled Tom to contribute to urban design efforts for the joint ASU/City of Phoenix Center for Urban Design. The most notable result of these activities has been the reevaluation of development controls on East Camelback and on South Central Avenue, and a re-thinking of the "Urban Village Model" by the City of Phoenix. In the aggregate, this work helped forge a strong link between the architecture program at ASU and the city of Phoenix. Urban Design Education Tom Laging, AIA, teaches urban design from a basis in practice. His Community Based Teaching experience as a young urban designer with the late Charles Blessing, FAIA, at the Detroit City Plan Commission and his early work in Peru on the first metropolitan plan for Lima as a U.S. Peace Corps Volunteer taught Tom the critical role of community participation in large scale design activities. These early experiences lead to: Laging founding the Environmental Action Studio as a beginning teacher. This community-based design studio evolved into a joint University/Omaha Chapter AIA Community Design Center. Tom and his students were instrumental in establishing the physical presence for the CDC in a storefront location in North Omaha. Under Laging's leadership, the center undertook many projects and

## Advancement of Professional Education Through Service to the Profession

	Tom Laging, AIA, has contributed to the advancement of the standards of architectural education and practice though his dedicated and highly successful efforts to nurture students to be concerned for the design of their communities. Actively engaging his peers and his students, in civic involvement, he has advanced the community building imperative of the profession at the national level.
National Urban Design Leadership	Embracing the mission of the AIA/RUDC and RUDAT task force, Tom Laging has made significant impacts as a national R/UDAT Team leader and team member in six communities across the country. His skill in leadership and cutting edge knowledge of urban design issues enabled him to manage and help assemble national teams tailored to the specific issues of the individual communities. Notable developments have taken place in each of the communities where Tom served as Chair. Specifically the Farmington R/UDAT led to the reclamation of its river resource. The Lawrence R/UDAT opened a door to better communications with the Latino community. The Bellingham R/UDAT prevented the siting of a minor building in the foreground of the city's most significant historic landmark.
Urban Design Education	As a member of the AIA-RUDC committee on education, Tom Laging, AIA, has helped to forge important linkages between the AIA and the Association of Collegiate Schools of Architecture (ACSA). Laging contributed to the success of four special paper sessions on urban design at national ACSA conferences. These sessions raised the level of awareness about urban design issues among academics and practicing professionals. The AIA sponsored publication, Urban Design Visions and Reflections Collected Essays, is a compilation of the papers delivered at several of these special paper sessions.
Service to NCARB	As a four time design and site planning grader for the western region NCARB, Laging brings the perspective of professional standards for registration to the Nebraska architecture program. He developed a corresponding system of comprehensive graduate exams and on three occasions graded as well as coached architects-in-training for the NCARB exam.
Service to Nebraska Board of Engineers and Architects	For the past fourteen years, Laging has served on the Nebraska Board of Engineers and Architects and has served as the chairman. He has served on the NCARB Education Committee which has numerous current proposals to improve the process of education, internship, examination, registration and professional practice.




Centennial Mall design and study, now under construction









Members of the Selection Committee:

It is an honor for me to write on behalf of **Thomas Laging, FAIA**, recently retired and now distinguished *professor emeritus* of the UN-L College of Architecture, in consideration of the 2014 Nebraska AIA *Cunningham Gold Medal*. Tom's prodigious accomplishments during his incredibly productive career exemplify the stated *criteria* for this prestigious recognition in many key aspects.

I have known Tom in a number of capacities that extend over the better part of five decades of teaching and professional relationships. He was already a highly regarded teacher at the University of Nebraska when I joined the faculty in 1969. I am in awe of his vast capabilities and know well the high regard that the hundreds (thousands?) of his former architecture students have of him. Through his instruction and mentorship, the enormous and positive influence **Prof. Laging has had on the practice of architecture throughout Nebraska is incalculable**.

Outside of the academic classroom, I have worked alongside Tom on numerous urban design activities, including as co-directors of the critically acclaimed "Nebraska Capitol and Environs Study" funded in part by the *National Endowment of the Arts*. The residual impact of that 1970s effort and subsequent legislation and policies promulgated by both the State and the City of Lincoln is very much evident today – helping to insure a lasting dignity to this most distinctive edifice and a testament of the highest ideals of our design professions.

In my own professional career I have had the opportunity to organize and direct approximately twenty urban design and planning *charrettes* – in Arizona, Florida, as well as New Mexico – for various public agencies and major universities. With each project, I have endeavored to enlist Tom's services and with that depended heavily on his design leadership. **His soaring design talent and representational skills are, without question, extraordinary and, I would assert, as have others, truly "world class."** (This past weekend, in fact, we completed another very successful *Visioning and Design Workshop*, this for the *New Mexico School for the Arts* in Santa Fe. Tom, as always, was simply brilliant.)

As a valued colleague and long-time friend, I can attest to the many excellent qualities that underpin his professional activities and his personal life, inspirational to all and a tribute to our noble profession. We honor ourselves with this deserved recognition of Thomas Laging as the 2014 recipient of the AIA Nebraska *Harry F. Cunningham Gold Medal*.

It is my honor to support Thomas S. Laging, FAIA, Professor Emeritus of Architecture at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln as nominee for the 2014 Cunningham Gold Medal. As a member of the architectural community in Nebraska for the past 43 years, 33 of which have been serving in the preservation and enhancement of our landmark State Capitol and its environs, I will concentrate on this area of Tom's considerable influence.

My experience with Professor Laging started with his co-authoring the 1975 Nebraska Capitol and Environs Plan, an award-winning document which, in my opinion, launched current public awareness and support for the preservation and enhancement of the Capitol and, especially, for what we know today as the Capitol Environs District.

From efforts lead by Tom, and a community based group of his professional colleagues and former UNL graduates in the profession, the *The Capitol Environs, East and South Mall Proposal* was developed in 1984 via a charrette process in Tom's campus studio. Among the many recommendations in this proposal, the creation of a permanent public body was called for to perpetually oversee preservation and enhancement of the urban setting for the Capitol within Lincoln. This lead to the passage of City and State legislation enabling the creation of the current, joint city and state, Nebraska Capitol Environs Commission in 1987.

Professor Laging was then appointed as a founding member of the original Capitol Environs Commission in 1988 and has continued to serve and help guide this important public body up to the current day. During his tenure on the Commission, his 1975 publication and 1984 East and South Mall Proposal were adopted as 2014 Cunningham Gold Medal Nomination for Thomas S. reference documents for the body. Subsequently, he helped develop the current Capitol Environs Design Standards enacted into law in 1994. He helped guide the creation of a plan to redevelop Centennial Mall in 1996 and then to personally modify and update this plan in 2001 when initial efforts to implement redevelopment had stalled. As most Nebraskans know, Centennial Mall is currently under redevelopment as a result of on-going Environs Commission efforts to keep the needs of the Capitol Environs in front of our state and local leaders. Professor Laging served as design consultant to the firm which created the design being implemented.

Although Tom Laging's numerous professional achievements are far more extensive than those enumerated in this letter, I believe his four decades of public service to benefit and enable the preservation and enhancement of our landmark Capitol and particularly its Environs within the City, more than warrant his selection as recipient of the 2014 Cunningham Gold Medal.
